Parishes in England and Wales - Some Statistics

The statistics below cover rural parishes, and some areas with some urban build up, but not the main urban areas.

As at 1 April 2003, there were 10,397 parishes in England. At the same time there were 868 communities in Wales.

In 2003, there were 111 parishes with less than 20 residents. There were 49 parishes with 25,000 residents or above. There were 4,165 parishes with between 100 and 500 residents.

Dad liked being around his family and friends, and very rarely did he and Mum go anywhere without us 3 girls in tow. So I know he was very much a family man. But what he thought about life and all that goes with it is the question that I would like to ask him.

Why Great Grandfather?

I know your name was Napoleon Jean Marc Mesure. A few years ago I wrote a story about you. I called it *The Man from Cintheaux*. I know you were born in the village of Cintheaux in Normandy, France and I have visited there.

I was quite happy at this time of my research that you worked as a ship's cook and that you and Marie Louise Delorme arrived in Australia on the ship *Sydney* in 1884 presumably from France. I found some of these details from your Naturalisation Certificate. But then doubt was cast on all this when I learned some other facts by chance in a letter.

Recently I was exploring on Trove and I put in your name. Up came a reference to your bankruptcy while you lived at Hoxton Park, near Liverpool. So I went to the archives and looked up your bankruptcy file. At the back of the file with all the details of your bankruptcy was a letter dictated by you. This letter has left me now wondering a lot of things about you.

You mention that you served your eight years at New Caledonia and that you didn't try to escape. This is my first problem. Why should you have been in a

position where the only way out was to escape? Surely if you were free to come and go if you were a ship's cook. Why were you in New Caledonia, a French convict colony? Were you there as part of the French Navy looking after the convicts or were you one of the convicts? If you were a convict, what was your offence? If not what duties kept you there?

You also mention that your wife, Mary died on New Hebrides. Why was she there? What was the cause of here death? Was she a convict? Now I know from your letter that she was not Marie Louise Delorme, my Great Grandmother whom you also refer to as Mary in the letter and who became your wife in 1891 at a marriage at All Saints Church in Liverpool NSW. So did you have an earlier marriage? If so what was your first wife's full name?

You mention leaving children in France. How many were there? What happened to them? Who cared for them and where if both you and your wife were away from France?

You mention coming to Sydney from New Caledonia in 1884 and that you and Marie Louise Delorme had a son born in 1887. I know this and I also know that the child, Louis Delorme Mesure died when only a couple of months old at Balmain. On his Birth Certificate it says you were married in France but this could not have been to his mother Marie Louise Delorme for you married her in 1891.

How did you meet Marie Louise Delorme? Where did she come from? She told my mother many stories. One was that she eloped with you. Is this true? To me it seems that she was too old in 1891 for it to be called an elopement. Another story was that her parents were very strict and that she would climb out of her bedroom window to go to dances and meet you. Is this true? If so, where did this take place?

Why did you come to Australia after your eight years were up? Why didn't you go back to France to your children there? Why did you not tell your daughter, Rosina about your life? She told me so much about living at Hoxton Park and Smithfield with you and Marie Louise and later with her brother. I am sure that if she knew about your earlier life, she would have told me.

Also why did you never have your photograph taken? I wish you had for then I would know what you looked like.

Did you know that I was named Marie for my Great Grandmother? Did you also know that she went on to have a long life and died in 1940 in Brisbane where she had been living with her son?

I hope you can find some way to help me answer all these questions you have caused me to have for I would dearly love to solve them.

Talking to my Great Grand Father - George Carter

Great grand father there is much I would like to know about you. Were you sent to the Colony as a convict, and if so what offence did you commit?

I did find your marriage to Catherine Doyle (alias Catherine Johnson) at St Luke's Church, East Maitland. Both of you were from the Port Stephens area. What were both of you doing there, were you employed and if so as what?

Catherine and you started your family at Page/Page River, where your son, William and then Sarah were born. The sponsor for Sarah at her baptism was Thomas Heydon, who was the owner of the property, which became Heydontown, thence Murrurundi.

When your last child, Elisa Carter was born at Singleton your occupation was given as "mechanic". How did this occupation apply? This location was where Catherine's father, Alexander Johnson had been sent as a convict to work for Helenus Scott at his Glendon property.

From that location I cannot trace where you and your young family went. From an obituary of your son William I learnt that your family had spent time in the gold fields.

After that period I discovered that you and your son William were at Reedy

Creek (Upper Adelong) where you were working for the Callaway family until you were killed by the falling of a gum tree.

The information for your death could only have come from your son William about your time in the Colony and roughly your age.

At this point of time there is no mention of your wife, Catherine, and two daughters. What happened between you and your wife?

My questions would be to my Great Grandfather, Edward Lawn, who was transported to the Colony of New South Wales, arriving on the Royal Admiral on 26.10.1833., convicted of picking pockets in Dublin City.

Edward's Certificate of Freedom granted on 10 December 1839 shows that he was headed for Muswelbrook. I would ask Edward what he did between 1839 and 1852 when he married Catherine Cunningham in Mount Alexander, (which became Sandhurst, then Bendigo) Victoria. I would also ask about the three Irish Orphans, whose names were Sarah Lawn, Alice Lawn and Ellen Lawn, who arrived on the Lady Kennaway on 13 December 1848. The names of these girls parents were exactly the same as Edward's, they also settled near to Edward.

My last question would be why Edward and Catherine registered the births of their five daughters but not their only son, my grandfather, also christened Edward. Oh how I wish I could ask these questions of him, it would solve so many puzzles.

Assizes: criminal trials 1559-1971

You can use this guide to find assize court records from England and Wales, to understand how they are arranged and what information you may find in them.

Assize records give the name, occupation and place of abode of the accused, but some or all of this information can be unreliable as aliases were often used and other false details were given. The place of abode mentioned is often where the crime took place rather than where the accused lived.

Originally the assizes mainly dealt with property disputes, but eventually they began to try criminal cases as well as cases passed on from the central Westminster courts to the assizes under the 'nisi prius' system.

From 1559 assize judges mainly dealt with the more serious criminal offences.

Access this guide to find out how to find assize records in The National Archives Catalogue. There are browsing and search facilities in the catalogue.

London, Middlesex and the palatinates of Lancashire, Durham and Cheshire were not included in the assize system. You can find more information for those areas in separate Research guides.

Records from before 1559 are covered by the research guide on General Eyres.

For records from 1972 see the research guide on Criminal courts in England and Wales from 1972.

Ephemera Files

The Local Studies section at H.J. Daley Library has an extensive amount of ephemera files that are available for the public to use for research. They are contained in large white envelopes. These files consist of material such as letters, newspaper and magazine articles, maps, manuscripts and family papers and realia. All material from the ephemera files can be viewed in the library and in most cases can be copied. There are however some files that cannot be copied due either to the nature of the material or the instructions given by the person donating the contents.

The ephemera files are mostly closed access to the public, although a small number of files are open access. Local Studies or Reference desk staff hold keys to the locked filing cabinets.

The material collected relates to Campbelltown or the surrounding areas. The files we collect might cover prominent people in the Campbelltown area, buildings or properties, geographical features such as the Georges River, population statistics and general information about suburbs and towns within the Campbelltown LGA.

Examples of some of the hundreds of files that the Local Studies section has include material on: Frederick Fisher; Hotels; Land grants; Longhurst family; Richmond Villa; St Peters Cemetery; Campbelltown Catholic Club; and even a file on Lisa Wilkinson!

Each of our files is catalogued on to the library's catalogue so they are able to be searched by the public. They can be searched by keyword or by subject. "Local Studies Pamphlet" will be given as the location and the contents of each envelope will be listed on the catalogue record.

The ephemera files are a valuable component of the Local Studies collection as they often provide information not covered in books, journals or newspapers. On countless occasions they have provided the answer to that difficult question when all other sources have been exhausted.
