



Who's afraid of Windows 8 (and how can I run old programs)?

Questions such as 'Do I upgrade to Windows 8', 'Will my family history software run under Windows 8', 'Would I be better going to Windows 7' are often heard from users of Windows XP.

The confusion surrounding these issues is mainly driven by the inability and/or interest of people to remain abreast of the continual changes in technology. For many computer users there has been little need to upgrade their system since Windows 3.0 was introduced back in 1993 other than to connect to the Internet.

Windows 8 is the latest incarnation of the Microsoft Windows Operating System (OS) and has received a negative response from Windows users worldwide. According to Computerworld Magazine (Jan 2014) Windows 8/8.1 is installed on only 11.6% of all PC's running Microsoft operating systems, compared to Windows 7 at 52.4% and Windows XP (which was released in 2001) still accounting for 32% of Windows users.

However, this low uptake does not mean that the operating system is poor or any worse than previous versions. The low uptake has been due to two primary aspects; (a) the radical change to the user interface removing any familiarity to earlier versions, and (b) the low sales of new PCs due to the growth in Tablet sales.

On this last aspect a Tablet is not a replacement for a PC unless you do all of your computing work on the internet. Do not fall for the sales pitch.

Windows 8 usability and the inability to run older software on it are 2 separate issues and consequently will be treated as such, but first to dispel a few myths.

• Myth: Windows 8 is not as good as Windows 7.

Windows 8 is fundamentally Windows 7 with much improved performance and security and a new 'tiled' user interface to enable it be used on Windows Tablets as well as PCs.

I use both Windows 7 and Windows 8 on my array of PCs, in both desktop and network environments and for robustness and performance Windows 8 wins hands down

• Myth: All versions of Windows 7 are the same

No. All version of Windows 7 are not the same. Besides being available in 6 flavours, i.e. Starter, Home, Home Premium, Professional, Enterprise, and Ultimate (the latter 3 including a Windows XP Mode to enable running programs written for Windows XP) there are both 32 bit and 64 bit versions of each. This I will clarify later however to maximise usability of older programs a 32 bit version of Windows 7 or 8 is highly recommended.

The features and options available in Windows 7 depend on the edition purchased and anything made for Windows Vista will run on Windows 7 as the latter was an incremental upgrade to Windows Vista, not a major release.

1. Windows 8 Usability

It is often heard that the Windows 8 user interface is too difficult to use, and the question echoing everywhere is 'Why did Microsoft change it as the 'Desktop' interface of Windows 7 and earlier was much easier to use'?

This I wholeheartedly agree with, and it is not only because of familiarity with older windows versions.

The Windows 8 'tile' interface was designed for use with touchscreens, the domain of Tablets and some Laptops, and in these environments it works reasonably well. It works especially well on Tablets as they are dominated by Apps, not complex programs often comprising a multiple of supporting files. It is because of this design focus the major issues that I have found are:

- 2. It is a nightmare to use with a mouse,
- 3. Often when installing programs the icon (tile) does not appear on the Start Screen whilst on other occasions an icon (tile) will be created for supporting files,
- 4. 'Tiles' run off into the distance when searching for files when you have a large number for files on your PC, Everything is buried

In essence the problem comes down to there being no single launching place to

access programs ... NO START BUTTON.



Windows® Start Buttons

For all of the problems there are a number of workarounds to make thing much easier. These include:

- By pressing the Windows key you can switch between the 'tile' interface and the familiar Windows Desktop resplendent with icons to enable launching programs. However, as there is no START Button you are restricted to programs which have icons on the Desktop, the File Manager and Internet Explorer buttons on the Taskbar.
- Windows 8.1 saw the return of the START Button but it is a poor imitation of its former self with limited access to programs. This will allow you to open your PC at the Desktop screen and with a bit of effort you can reconfigure the START Button to open the 'APPS VIEW' screen therefore facilitating access to installed programs. There is no 'All Programs' option as in earlier OS versions
- Download and install a 3rd party START Button. This is undoubtedly the most effective option and there are a number of options available in this respect. You can select the 'STORE' tile from the Start Screen to access the WINDOWS STORE and search from START BUTTON. A number are available to choose from, some free.

Alternatively visit http://www.stardock.com/products/start8/ and purchase the START8 button for US \$5.00. I have been using this since Windows 8 was released and highly recommend it as it returns the full functionality of earlier Windows START Buttons.

Once installing a 3rd party START Button you will find that there is very little difference between using Windows 7 and Windows 8 in everyday use.

2. Can older software run on Windows 7 and/or 8?

As stated previously, under the hood there is little difference between Windows 7 and Windows 8 however to answer this question requires a little technical jargon to identify the problem.

All versions of Windows since XP come in two flavours, 32 bit and 64 bit. Although Windows XP was a 32 bit operating system (OS), it also could run 16 bit programs because built in was what is known as a 16 bit Virtual Mode. This facility was removed in Windows 7.

What is this 16/32/64 bit nonsense? In basic terms, it is the size of the data chunks that the operating system uses for processing, and this is a critical factor in determining a program's compatibility. The packaging of most software it display this information.

The primary differences between the 32 bit and 64 bit versions of the operating system are:

- A 32 bit OS cannot run 64 bit programs. To a lesser degree the reverse applies, e.g. if you have a 64 bit version of Microsoft Office you will not be able to install many of the Office add-ons as they are mostly 32 bit, and
- A 32 bit OS cannot access more than 3.25Gb of memory. This means that if you have 8Gb of RAM and a 32 bit OS, 5.75Gb of RAM will never be used. To use the full 8Gb a 64 bit OS is required.

Programs that will not run on Windows 8 will most probably not run on Windows 7 either. As mentioned earlier the Professional edition or better of Windows 7 has a Windows XP Mode built in which will allow the running of older programs. Also, according to the Microsoft, this functionality is included in Windows 8 (32 bit versions only) through the option called 16-Bit Application Support available from the Control Pane. I have not been able to confirm or test this as all my computers have a 64 bit OS.

In fact many programs that ran on Windows XP will not run on Windows Vista

either, and NO 16 bit programs can run on a 64bit Windows OS.

Also the reverse of this applies in that some newer programs will not run on Windows XP and earlier due either advances in the Windows graphic interface or the development environments in which they are written. Using my program 'Genota' as an example, in 2011 I upgraded my software development platform and as a direct consequence versions of Genota released since that time will not run on Windows 98, NT or 2000 and I have to be careful as to what functionality I include as it may not be compatible with the Windows XP graphics system.

Thankfully all is not lost. Most 32 bit applications, including. Legacy Family Tree and Family Tree Maker, Roots Magic and Genota, will run fine on windows 7 and 8, 64 bit operating systems.

3. Using old family history resource CD-ROMS on Windows 7 or 8?

The bottom line is most likely not as many of them use a 16 bit program for accessing the file data. I have heard that the DIGGER series is not being upgraded, and the upgrading of some BDM Indexes are in limbo due to a refocus by the publishers on internet access. In addition, the Church of Latter Day Saints has withdrawn from software therefore all LDS CD-ROMS including the PAF software will never be upgraded.

Like many people, I have found myself in this situation and have a library of CD-ROM disks that can no longer be accessed, but there are some workarounds available.

One solution is a program called 'BDM Data Viewer' which can read and interrogate the NSW Pioneers and Federation Index CD-ROM disks. It is available from

www.peppermintfence.com/BDMDataViewer.htm at a cost of AUD \$20 and will read NSW Pioneer, Federation and Between the Wars Indexes, Victorian Pioneers Index, Tasmanian Pioneers Index and WA Pioneers Index. This has become a recent and much welcomed addition to my toolkit.

If you have a 64 bit version of Windows 7 or 8 and have old CD-ROMS that will no longer run, an option is to use an emulation program like DOSBOX, or a

Virtual Machine application such as Virtual PC or Virtual Box. These programs allow you to run a Windows OS inside a Windows OS, e.g. they allow the installation of Windows XP on a Windows 8 host PC. I use these programs extensively and if anyone is interested I would be happy to provide assistance in setting them up.

Lastly, in some instances data can be retrieved from a CD-ROM and imported into a spreadsheet or database program.

4. Conclusion

Don't be scared off Windows 8 by all of the gossip as there are workarounds, but in order to maximise the potential usability of older software, ensure that you purchase a PC with a 32 bit version of the Windows 7 or 8. If the Windows 8 user interface seems too daunting, download and install a 3rd party START Button which will enable you to use you PC in a similar manner as you have in past, or wait for Windows 9 which I have read is scheduled for mid 2015. All indications are that Microsoft will be greatly enhancing usability in Windows 9 largely because of the negative reaction to Windows 8. The unknown factor is what changes will there be to the underlying system with respect backwards compatibility of software.

If you prefer the Windows 7 route instead, be aware that it can be difficult to obtain a PC that has already installed unless purchased from an outlet that builds PCs to specification. Windows 7 is no longer available from the Microsoft online Store and most retailers do not carry it.

For those people currently using Windows XP, Microsoft is ceasing all support for it next month which means that future security issues will never be addressed, so ensure that you anti-virus and spyware programs are always upto-date.

St Peter's Font

The item we require funding for is our original baptismal font - not used for its original purpose after the new one was given in 1875. It travelled out to Glen Alpine, where the Reddall sisters lived until 1900 when the surviving sister died. At the sale of Glen Alpine effects held some time after that date the font was bought by the Sedgwick family and was taken to Smeaton, where it was used as a bird bath. It was noticed by Dr. Thomas, who had established the Campbelltown and Airds Historical Society in 1947. He recognised it for what it was, and bought it and moved it to his garage where it was stored for some years. On his death in 1960 it travelled to his widow's home in Lindesay St, and when she moved from the district it was given to the Rev Geoff Chandler for safe keeping and kept in the old rectory garage. When that was needed by the Youth Group it was taken over by the Historical Society where it lived for a few years in their Stables Museum. When they moved to Richmond Villa it became a problem and it was just when the church was establishing the Church Office in the current administration building so it was moved into the entranceway and has proved a talking point there for many years. When the present Senior Minister, Rev Nigel Fortescue was re-furbishing the entrance he moved it out and hearing its history decided to get a quote for its renovation and restoration. James Gardner is a local heritage stonemason, and his quote was reasonable for the work to be done.

It has not been quite decided where the restored font, will be placed.

This is a heritage project worthy of consideration from all of you it has links with our historic church, and the families baptised in the font, until 1875, with the Reddall family of Glen Alpine, with the Sedgwick family of Smeaton and with Ivor Gwynne Thomas, founder of the Campbelltown and Airds Historical Society and parish historian.




